**President's Notes**

**Extending Our Welcome**

It was a delight to participate in the Town Hall Meeting on April 20<sup>th</sup> to solicit the input of the congregation on the Welcoming Congregation Program and Designation. The congregational response was overwhelmingly in favor of the program, and those "dissenting" voices were not those who believe that we should not be more welcoming, but instead were ones of concern for singling out one group over another and that our welcoming should be even more widespread to include other disenfranchised groups.

In reality, I couldn't agree more! I wish we didn't need to single out any one group for welcome, but in American religious society, GLBT people are frequently singled out for discrimination, or are "welcomed" with various caveats, the lingering "but..." which limits the welcome.

While there are common elements to all forms of oppression, a topic which is covered in the welcoming congregation curriculum, the targets of each form of oppression have unique group characteristics, histories, and cultures. To be accepting of some oppressed group, whether it be race, gender, ability, affectional orientation, or any other category is not enough to be truly welcoming. It takes an understanding and appreciation of the unique life experiences that those people bring and how it enriches us all to include them.

I believe that the Welcoming Congregation program for GLBT people is not some be-all-end-all of understanding oppression, but instead it is only a beginning. A part of living the ideals of the Welcoming Congregation calls us to continue our study, to understand the various racial minorities that compose our society and undertake anti-racism work, to learn how both physical barriers and also attitudes affect and restrict the lives of the differently abled, and to understand the inequities in our society that are based on gender. The work to be truly welcoming is never ending, but is a process worth undertaking.

We have to start somewhere. I think that starting with GLBT people makes sense, because homophobia is still more accepted in our society than racism, sexism, or ableism. The law protects people from discrimination in other categories, but not based on orientation (some places, yes, but not here). This was punctuated by one story of discrimination that was shared very tenderly at the town hall meeting, and I was very touched and grateful for that sharing.

# Reflections

... of Rev Ann Marie Alderman

I am happy to share the great news that 58 households responded to the Pledge Campaign making financial commitments totaling nearly \$83,000. As the Finance Committee and I expect there may be a few more regular contributors who have yet to make a pledge, but who soon will, we advised the Board to set the pledge income budget for July 2008 through June 2009 at \$85,000. That sum represents a nearly 10% increase over this year's (2007/8) pledge income. That's an increase that the pledging members and friends of UUCG can be very proud of! That increase represents a big statement of support and approval for the direction UUCG is headed!

If you are among the few who have yet to make a pledge, I hope you will. Even a small amount, especially if you are experiencing a financially challenging time, can also make a big statement and make you feel good! Did you know that nearly \$100 a year per member is paid by UUCG to stay con-

nected with other UU's in our area and for UUCG to remain a member congregation of the UU Association? If you make a pledge of \$8 a month that is enough to keep another member from paying those "dues" sent for you to the Thomas Jefferson District and the UUA. Making a pledge of \$10 a month, would be making a statement that you do what is fair, and don't rely on another member to pay your dues!

As more pledges come in the lean and responsible proposed budget that will be presented to the Members for approval on May 18<sup>th</sup> may be adjusted! In the meantime, many thanks are due to all those leaders who spent so much time and energy in conversation, working toward consensus to create next year's proposed income and expense amounts in a way that does not rely on savings to make ends meet, yet insures that UUCG's liberal presence in Greenville will be alive and well! Good work, everyone!

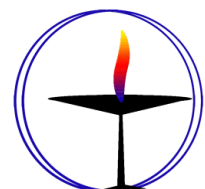
